This June, Pratt Fine Arts Center is launching its first Summer Art Week for teens. Classes will focus on the fundamentals of screenprinting, glassblowing, woodworking, frameworking, welding & metal sculpture and painting & drawing. Teens ages thirteen and older and with any level of artistic experience are welcome.

"We have been working hard to build a new art curriculum that will excite teens," said Erik Halaas, Youth Art Works Manager at Pratt Fine Arts Center. "The Summer Art Week classes are designed to expose students to the art world and allow them to explore new art media and techniques."

"The instructors of our first-ever Summer Art Week are working artists who have experience teaching youth and who are able to give teens the one-on-one attention they need to develop their own artistic voice," said Pratt Fine Arts Center Director of Education, Tracey Fugami.
